Chairman's Message

Dear Foundation Supporters,

I am pleased to report that the California Ricelands Waterbird Foundation ("Foundation") continued and expanded its work to preserve the Pacific Flyway by putting your generous sponsorships and donations to work creating quality habitat in the Sacramento Valley. We not only continued our targeted investments into bird habitat but we also invested into exciting new efforts to use rice fields to help struggling salmon populations.

Notable developments over the last year include being awarded a generous grant from the S. D. Bechtel, Jr. Foundation that has now engaged us on a major new project to develop critical information about how we may someday be able to raise baby salmon on winter-flooded rice fields. It is amazing to contemplate that, through the development of specific management practices, young salmon may someday be able to access their historic floodplain again. This could be a game changer and the work of this Foundation, in coordination with the California Rice Commission, UC Davis and California Trout, is making important strides towards this goal. I am already excited about my opportunity to write next year's Chairman's Message to report on all that we will learn from our upcoming two seasons of field work finishing up early in early-2020. So please stay tuned!

Our ongoing investments into our core mission of providing food and habitat for millions of migrating waterbirds in the Sacramento Valley continued with our cooperative efforts with The Nature Conservancy. Together, we placed more high-quality habitat for shorebirds on the landscape in Fall 2018 using donations from you. These investments expanded habitat for at least ten species of shorebirds which have scarce habitat options during their migration this time of year, while also providing habitat for many other waterbird species as well. Survey data documented that over 56,000 birds utilized this important habitat.

Thank you for your help in enabling us to expand the breadth of our wildlife conservation programs in the Sacramento Valley region to support the diverse populations of waterbirds and other wildlife. Together, we will invest intelligently and leverage your generous donations on collaborative projects with key agencies and other partners for an even greater beneficial impact on biodiversity here in our backyard.

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The California Ricelands Waterbird Foundation ("Foundation") was created in 2015 for the purpose of receiving tax-deductible donor funds to implement activities that

Major Activities

create and promote real habitat projects on the ground in and around California ricelands. Over the past four years, we have utilized annual donations that were predetermined as qualifying matching funds for a California Rice Commission (CRC) grant from the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) under the NRCS's Regional Conservation Partnership Program (RCPP) as well as additional funds from annual fundraising activities of the Foundation.

The Foundation uses its funds to invest in our mission to enhance the ecological value of California rice fields to help sustain millions of waterbirds and other wildlife in the Pacific Flyway for future generations. To date, we have invested over 90 percent of our donors' contributions directly into projects in the field.

This period included the following major activities:

- 1) Substantially increased our funding and portfolio of work by receiving a major grant to help fund a salmon recovery pilot project.
- 2) Invested donor dollars into high-quality shorebird projects.
- 3) Continued our efforts to pursue additional donations (beyond RCPP pledges).

New Efforts on Salmon Recovery

In FY 2018-19, we deployed about half of a generous \$100,000 grant from the S. D. Bechtel, Jr. Foundation that assisted us in securing a \$1.4 million project with the Natural Resources Conservation Service (NRCS) into an innovative salmon habitat pilot project with UC Davis and our conservation partners. This work included preparing a field site for the later introduction of 30,000 juvenile salmon from the Feather River Hatchery into a specially-prepared, winter-flooded

rice field. This work was documented on a dedicated website (<u>www.salmon.calrice.org</u>), also linked to our Foundation website (<u>www.CalRiceWaterbirds.org</u>), providing interesting photos, blogs, podcasts and video clips of our significant work in rice fields which expanded in the following fiscal year and will be discussed in greater detail in our next annual report.

Habitat Enhancement Project Investments

During the 2018-2019 fiscal year, we leveraged our efforts with The Nature Conservancy (TNC) to run a unique program called BirdReturns and invested over \$60,000 in fall of 2018 to create an additional 1,500 acres of quality habitat for shorebirds. The effort funded contracts with rice farmers for shallow flooding and waterbird-friendly management practices in September and early-October, a time of year when the majority of fields in rice country are still in production and quality open, shallow water habitat is extremely scarce on the landscape. Growers were required to manage post-harvest vegetation and straw to unique specifications to achieve minimal standing stubble and matted vegetation to provide ideal foraging habitat for shorebirds.

Target species include but not limited to, longbilled dowitcher, least sandpiper, dunlin, greater yellowlegs, curlew, plover, black-necked stilts, white-faced ibis, and American avocet. Many other waterbird species also benefit from this habitat such as greater and lesser sandhill crane and numerous goose and duck species.

This habitat partnership between TNC and the California rice industry has been in place since 2014. In the Fall of 2018, TNC staff conducted a total of 230 surveys on the Foundation-funded BirdReturns project. During these surveys, over 56,300 birds were counted. This consisted of approximately 16,100 shorebirds, 14,500 waterfowl, 25,600 other waterbirds, and 35 corvids and hawks were documented to have utilized our project fields. Collection of Multi-Year Pledges

The Foundation implemented its annual invoicing process to collect the re-occurring original pledges to match the RCPP funding from NRCS. Our collection of those dollars resulted in \$34,200 of donations provided to the Foundation to support next fiscal year's habitat investments.

Pursuing Additional Donations

On an increasing scale, the Foundation continued its additional fundraising activities to generate donations beyond the RCPP pledges. This included a year-end fundraising outreach campaign using Twitter and a joint fundraising letter produced and distributed by the Foundation and CRC.

Our extra fundraising efforts (beyond the RCPP pledges) resulted in \$72,566 of additional donations to the Foundation to support next fiscal year's habitat investments.
